So why is this project boughed down due to a railroad right of way issue?


I inquired with a surveyor (Ensley should know this) what the railroad right of way was.

200 Feet.

+/- 100 Feet.

[Editor's Note: The surveyor said I would never find this information in any written document.] So, how does this impact the two submittals by Moseley and Hemphill?

First, let's look at the drawing for the property occupied by the current jail.



There is nothing in this drawing that depicts any sort of railroad right of way. Using the scale at the lower right, I added the right of way lines on the drawing, in violet.


Next, let's look at the current Google Earth image of the current jail.




Using the ruler feature of Google Earth, I created a line from the center of the railroad tracks to the portion of the jail, a distance of 100 feet. Notice that the current jail encroaches the railroad right of way.

The new proposals reference the outline of the current jail, and both new proposals lie between the current jail and the existing security fence.

The following two drawings show the two proposals, in relation to the existing jail building. I have drawn a red line, depicting where the two new proposals encroach in the railroad right of way.





As you can see, both of these proposals show the building within the +/- 100 feet right of way of the railroad.

So, we have some questions here:

- Why was this original RFQ never made public?
- Why didn't the RFQ mention anything about an existing right of way, so that these firms could take that into account when submitting their proposals?
- The current jail is within the current right of way. What kind of deal was made to have that happen?
- Evidently, the County owns the land, but that doesn't make any difference to the railroad.

There appears to be ample room to design a new jail within the available area clearing the railroad right of way.

Perhaps some of these issues will be brought up during the March 24th meeting. Let's see how this moves forward.
